Many Entries Reported for

Dog Show

at Raceland Sunday

Nearly 1000 Dogs Will Be at Annual Show Here on Sunday

With entries for the big canine sporting event of the season closed the chairman of the Framingham District Kennel club bench show committee announces 851 entries in this year's fixture at Raceland, on Sunday, August 23. This is only 60 behind the entries for 1941, which is amazing, considering gasoline rationing, defense work, and the other difficulties of the current season. Under normal conditions it is obvious from interest that the show would have gone over the 1000 dog-mark.

This is a tribute to the beauty of the setting of this now famous Framingham event and of the efficiency of the club and the hospitality and co-operation by exhibitors and gate alike that have always characterized the Framingham District Kennel club show, which is now a "must" with every dog fancier within commuting distance.

Among the unusual breeds to be seen will be a Basenji from Africa, known as the barkless dog. This breed, from Central Africa, is used by the natives for hunting. The dogs have a scenting ability three times greater than that of any other dog, scenting at 90 yards. They are highly intelligent and immaculately clean, washing themselves like cats.

The Basenji male, Barrie, who will make his debut at the Framingham show, will be the first Basenji whelped in America to be shown in this country. His mother was brought over from the African Congo last year; and his father was imported from Miss Tudor-Williams' kennels, the best known Basenji kennels in England. Barrie is from the kennels of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Phemister of Kingston, Mass. Judging starts at 1 p.m. sharp.
