## BASENJI CLUB of AMERICA

March 17, 1953

Dear Club Member:

This is your first bulletin of 1953 and there is considerable to report. The first important show of the year was Westminster at New York. Top honors went to Ch. Ace of the Congo owned by Miss Mary McWain of Batavia, New York. Best of winners was the winners bitch, Fairmont Lynn Lysande, owned by Mrs. E. O. Westlin of Palisade, New Jersey. Winner's dog was Phemister's Sandoa owned by young Miss Deborah Wescott of Clinton, New Jersey. Sandoa finished his championship title with this win. Puppy dog winner was Phemister's Harpocrates owned by Mr. Walter Philoof of New York City. The American bred dog winner, Mr. Arthur Kreugel's Kopper Nyckel was also winner's dog. Rhosenji Ideal owned by Mr. George Gilkey of Merrill, Wisconsin took reserve winner's bitch.

The annual meeting of the Basenji Club of America followed the Basenji judging. Because this annual meeting is always a much smaller attended meeting than our special meeting which is held at the time and place of the specialty show, Miss McWain, as presiding officer, tabled the greater part of the club business until the June 28th meeting.

Mrs. Sydney Byers, one of our California members, and Mr. James Maltbie of New Jersey served as tellers in tabulating the results of the mailed ballots for officers and board members for 1953. You members elected Miss Mary McWain president (incidentallythis same honor was extended Miss McWain in 1949). Also elected was Mrs. John Cadwell as vice-president; while I was re-elected secretary and Mr. James Maltbie, treasurer. The 1953 board members are as follows: Mr. Alexander Phemister Mr. George L. Gilkey, Mr. George Watt, Mrs. A. D. Jenkins (one of our Canadian members). Mr. Leo Shadic, Miss Eloise Gerry and Mr. John Cadwell. You voted to accept the proposed change of by-laws as proposed by Mr. George Gilkey. The year 1953 should be another great prosperous year for the Basenji Club of America.

The treasurer's report as of February 27, 1953, gives a balance of \$366.40, an increase of \$120. as of February 1952. Twenty-one new members joined our club in 1952. In the first two months of 1953, seven new members have been accepted by the club.

The most important business discussed at the club meeting concerned the approaching Basenji specialty show to be held June 28th at Rome, New York. Miss McWain reported that Mrs. Cadwell, as bench show chairman, was finding cooperation and that Miss Dayton as trophy chairman was already functioning efficiently. All other club business was tabled until the June 28th special meeting.

At the request of a club member that his available Basenji stock be listed in the bulletin, I wrote each member stating that if he or she had stock for sale and wrote back immediately to this effect, he would be listed as the owner of available Basenjis. Although this held up the mailing of the bulletin, I felt it only fair that all members have the same opportunity.
