



SOME MEMORIES OF THE TRIP TO THE SOUTHERN SUDAN

Sitting in the Embarkation Sheds at Liverpool, eyeing our fellow passengers who ranged from white to light brown, yellow, dark brown, black and ebony black and who proved to be interesting and charming.

A bad storm in the Bay of Biscay, and John wedging himself into his bunk with three life-jackets, which he hastily removed before the steward called him in the morning.

Watching the dolphins rubbing themselves against the bows of the ship in the Mediterranean, and then playing in the spray.

The dawn over the Suez Canal and talking to the Russian Pilot, who spoke perfect English, whilst taking the ship through.

Khartoum, with the temperature 120 degrees and the air strip like a blast furnace. At the Grand Hotel the edges of the glasses were hot, as though with tea instead of iced beer. Hot water ran out of the cold taps and nothing ran out of the hot taps. And the charge was L4 a day.

Arriving in the Southern Sudan and finding it a narrow strip of quite different vegetation to the rest of the Sudan, it was aglow with flowers, birds and butterflies; the butterflies were mostly swallowtails and the most fascinating bird was called, as far as I remember, the Bird of Paradise flycatcher --- it was a black bird, with a long forked tail of snowy white.

The magic moment, when after several days traveling, we arrived in the district where, many years ago, I had been told we would find Basenjis. We did, the natives came out to greet us, carrying long-legged, fine boned, really typical Baseniis.

Another never-to-be-forgotten moment when Michael called me in the early dawn, telling me to hurry. We jumped in the Land Rover and went rattling and lurching flat out down a jungle path. We arrived at a little clearing right in the forest where we sawafew native huts. We got out and waited, then three tiger-striped Basenjis walked into view. All I could think was that they looked just like the Red Indians in war paint of our story books,

slipping silently and arrogantly out of the forest.

The best moment of all, when I took possession of the 8 week old Fula, early Sunday morning, May 12th, just as Michael came out of the forest carrying Marry, another 8 week old puppy. We sprayed them with flea powder and got in the Land Rover. A few minutes later we looked down and our legs were black with fleas, which had left the puppies and taken refuge on us.

That night we stayed at the Catholic Mission, and Fula, only in my possession 12 hours, was suffering from dysentery. When I opened my bedroom door, she disappeared into the night and I had visions of having to rouse John, Michael, and the Holy Fathers for a search party. But first I took my torch, and shining it on my feet because of the snakes, I began looking for her. I found her on the only patch of grass about 200 yards away. By then she had done what she wished to do, and again disappeared into the darkness. But I was getting smart to Fula and went and looked in my room to find her curled up on my slippers because she was not big enough to get on the bed.

The day when the jolting of the Land Rover over the African "roads" upset John's liver, made Michael and the two dog puppies car-sick and Fula and I in the pink, looked at the four sorry bodies and said, "Men."

The terrible moment when a fish eagle dived out of the sky, we all rushed forward and if it had not missed Fula by inches, it would either have carried her off, or torn her with its beak and claws probably beyone recovery.

The night before we returned to civilization and took all our remaining stores, bully beef, beans, jam and tinned fruit and made it into a wonderful curry, which we ate by the camp fire.

Canine Psychology

THE RECIPE FOR MAKING A BASENJI CHAMPION

by Barbara J. Nolan

Now that I have told you theoretically how to rear a puppy and how to care for his emotional needs, I would like to impart some words of wisdom from an expert in the field of training champion Basenjis.

but can never repeat too often, the Basenji pups must be of good hereditary stock. One can never make a \$1000 show champion from a \$25. pup.

At the tender age of three weeks, we first start on the road to a well groomed dog. This is the first time the nails can be clipped and should be clipped weekly thereafter to maintain good feet and toes. This point in grooming cannot be over-emphasized.

In the next two weeks fondle the Basenji puppies as this is one of their emotional growing periods. When they reach four weeks of age begin their temporary shots and have them checked for parasites. (See your veterinarian about this, if you haven't already done so.) This also is a good time to begin the house-training episode - everyone has their own recipe for this but the one used by many successful breeders is as follows:

Keep the puppies corralled in a fairly large area - don't give the freedom of the house, especially the room with wall-to-wall carpeting. This room should have an outside door for quick exit purposes. Paper train the pups at first and after they have had the first puppy shot, they can go outdoors, weather permitting.

Four weeks of age is also about the right time to begin with collar training. This does not mean a chain or leather collar but a light weight strip of cloth with no dangling or tripem-up loose ends. They will probably be chewed up in short periods of time and the strips of cloth are much easier and less expensive than English leather collars. After the pups have had their collars on for a week or so, take them out by themselves, away from other dogs and people on a lightweight show lead. This will be a slow process at first but with patience and diligence and only about five minutes a day you will be on the way to making a good show

dog. If this is done for too long a period, the puppy and you will get tired - so train in short periods but do it consistently and always remember to praise the puppy.

Now for the next big step - which seems To begin with, as I have stated many times, to be one of the characteristics of a Basenji and I have noticed cartoons and funny articles on Basenjis chewing up the house, but when you have raised several Basenjis that have done this, it isn't very funny or amusing. I thought that it would be cheaper to have a professional trainer than to do it yourself but I was reassured by an experienced breeder that with a little self-discipline and a lot of patience and diligence one could master the feat by himself with the aid of his family and all his friends. So this is how I am going to raise a show dog - one who (continued on page 9)

'SOUTHERN EXPOSURE'

NIP IT IN THE BUD

by George C. Jones, III

Ask several people whom you consider to be authorities on Basenjis, to offer some advice on the importance of crate training and lead breaking, and while the suggestions you get will undoubtedly differ in phraseology, in so many words, all of them will stress, I am sure, the importance of beginning any phase of training at just as early an age as possible.

Whether you plan to show your Basenji or

not, a crate (I recommend the Kennel-Aire) can be a wonderful convenience whenever it becomes necessary to leave your dog unattended, and if properly trained, he will look upon the crate as his home, and will go into it of his own volition, and won't feel as though he is being punished when the door is fastened. However, don't expect a mature dog who has had no training to adjust immediately to the confines of such close quarters as a crate. You are certain to hear screams of protest, followed by a look from a languid eye, so much as to say, "What have I done to deserve this?" So to avoid this anguish on the Basenji's part, begin his training just as early as possible - six weeks of age isn't too soon, and the earlier, the better. The simplest method would of course be to take the young pup, close him up inside the crate, and walk away. But, take heed - this is definitely the wrong approach, and it will never, never work satisfactorily. You might begin by leaving the door of the crate open at all times. Make a bed on the inside for him and you might put a couple of his favorite toys in also, or anything that will entice the pup to enter. Let him come and go as he pleases for a few days, and don't close the door behind him the first time he goes into the crate. Wait until he becomes completely acclimated, then you probably won't have any trouble when the crate door is secured. You may even be surprised at how much your pup enjoys his crate - a refuge for him when he doesn't feel up to facing the problems of the world.

Similarly, lead breaking should present no problems if started soon enough. Begin by putting a makeshift collar on the pup. A piece

of fabric or a shoelace will work fine - anything to get him used to the feeling of having something around his neck. He may give you a little "conversation" at first, but after a few days, he will not even be conscious of the fact that the collar is there. After he has become accustomed to the collar, then attach the lead, such as a Resco Show Lead which is very light weight. I do not recommend a chain type collar or lead, as they are much too heavy and serve no particular purpose. The first attempts to get the pup to walk are likely to be unsuccessfui, as he will surely try and break away or buck the lead. But, with a little patience and understanding on your part, success is inevitable. Training periods should never be extensive or prolonged, and when you see indications of the pup's tiring, that's the time to stop.

To all of you Yankees wishing to get away from that cold, bleak, biting weather, why not come to Florida for the January Circuit, and some real fun in the sun. Snow is alright I guess, but as for me, I'll take a palm tree any old time.

doesn't wet the wall to wall carpet and who doesn't chew up the house and who doesn't carry his toys and blankets to his master's bed.

To help prevent - I use the word "help" here because no theory except for a methematical one is absolute - to prevent the house from being demolished by a Basenji, instead of the usual termites, is to supplement the chewing diet with lots of toys, hard rubber balls. leather tug toys and Nylabones or other treated bones. The experts in the field - who have aptly proven this with many litters because their house still stands - say not to give all the toys to the children, I mean puppies, at one time because they become bored with the same ones. Keep rotating the toys to keep up the interest in the toys and not the furniture. When they leave their toys and start for the expensive goods - tell them in a serious but stern voice.

"No," and if you don't get the response the first time tell them again and this time with a light rap across the nose and at the same time hand them a toy to chew on.

Remember not to laugh at their cute antics because they love to entertain you and this will always cause discipline to go to 'rack and ruin. Basenjis love to entertain you but laugh with them, not at them.

To train a show dog isn't really difficult but it takes a lot of patience and diligence. This must all be carried out in a program of continuity and consistency.

TRAVELING WITH YOUR PET BASENJI

Alma S. Birnn

As it happens, when our Basenji, "Cheri," travels with us, we are traveling with our trailer. However, she always rides in the car with us. This for two or three reasons - First, she would be frightened out of her skin to be confined to a trailer in transit (alone) and Second, we know when she needs a drink or a walk. We take her water dish in the car and when necessary we fill it from our own thermos jug of cool water. This is especially important in hot weather.

However, this suggestion still holds good for those who travel with car only. In such a case I would suggest taking the water dish and and food dish to which the dog is accustomed. Also a supply of food which the dog likes, and don't forget the can opener. If your dog likes Gainesburgers, fine; however they have a tendency to induce constipation in our dog, although she loves them. She does not like milk and cares little for water unless it is cool and (a) she has been exercising or (b) the weather is hot. She adores cottage cheese and this seems to counter-act any incipient constipation.

She was whelped and raised in Florida so we always take along an old army blanket for her to sleep on. (We've tried wrapping her in it, but she squirms out, not liking to be covered). However, lying on wool seems to give her warmth. In visiting cold climates, she wears a a sweater or coat...again, because she is only accustomed to warmth.

When staying at hotels or motels, take the dog's bed if he is used to sleeping in one. Otherwise, take an old jacket or something of the sort, bearing the scent of the owner. It will keep the dog off the floor, off the bed and furniture and provide a sense of the owner's returning in case the dog must be left alone.

If visiting Canada, be sure your dog has all shots and the Veterinarian's certificate attesting to the fact. The certificate should be dated as as near departure time as possible. Have your ownership papers with you and, above all, be sure your dog is wearing some sort of identification tag in case he strays. Keeping the dog on leash is the safest measure whenever you are away from home.

In regard to dogs riding or traveling in cars, I wish some one would design a safety belt or harness for dogs. Enough leeway so they could see out the windows but not enough to jump out should they see another dog with which they wish to get acquainted. It would also prevent the dog leaping from seat to seat; sometimes distracting the driver dangerously. It would also permit the dog to be left in a parked car with the windows open wider for more air.


