

### GENETICS AND THE BASENJI

Both Marsha and Nancy graduated from Arizona State University in 1967 with a B. S. degree in Animal Science. Nancy minored in Zoology and English, and Marsha minored in Chemistry and Zoology. Currently they are both working on their Masters, PHD program. Nancy at the University of Illinois, at Urbana in Physiology and Marsha at Michigan State University in Population Genetics, both under the Department of Animal Science. Nancy's home is Elcho, Wisconsin and Marsha is from Chandler, Arizona, where she keeps her Baseniis (SHIFTING SANDS KENNEL) with her parents.

BASENJI GENETICS will be published in a series of installments. We hope you will enjoy them, and if there are any questions, please send them to Marsha and she will try to answer them in the next month's installment.

Ideas about genetics have existed since the Greek philosophers. A brief background of some of these ideas and the men who fathered them will give you a better understanding of the science of genetics as it is known today.

Most of the early beliefs were so mixed with misinformation that they were of little value. For example, the Greeks believed that the giraffe arose from crossing a camel with a leopard. A camel crossed with a boar, resulted in a two humped camel, while a camel and a sparrow gave rise to an ostrich! Such thoughts persisted for over two thousand years, clouding the road for further advancement. It was not until the seventeenth century that any light was shed upon the concept of reproduction.

William Harvey (1578-1657) was the first to present the idea of sexual reproduction in animals. He was unable to see sperm, but he did grasp the idea that seman somehow fertilized the egg in the female.


Regnur de Graaf (1641-1673), classified as the first embryologist, could only talk in general terms about the process of ovulation and embryo development, since without a microscope, he was unable to see into the small world of the

Leewenhock (1632-1723), a Dutch naturalist, advanced science more than any inventer. His microscope, developed in 1677, made the microworld as visible as the macroworld. Leewenhock observed the union of eggs and sperm of frogs and fish, and noted for the first time that it took only one egg and one sperm to form an embryo, and that only one sperm penetrated an egg. It was not until 1823 that the use of a better microscope enabled Von Baer to discover the tiny mammalian

These new discoveries led to the development of new theories among scientists. One of the first theories presented was that of preformation. It stated that the sperm carried a complete individual, and the individual merely grew larger in time with no change in form. The egg supplied nourishment only. Another group, the ovists, claimed that the individual was in the egg and the sperm merely supplied the stimulus needed for growth.

Both of these theories have been disproved by modern science but they were useful in that they provided the first mechanical basis for reproduction. The theory of epigenesis, first proposed by Wolff in 1759, displaced them and is still the accepted theory today. It states that both the sperm and the egg contain unspecialized cellular material that upon conception develops and differentiates into tissues and organs. Thus the embryo grows and constantly changes form.

Knowledge of the embryo and syngamy was accumulated over centuries. Lamark (1744-1829), a French naturalist is called the father of the modern theory of evolution. Why variation occurred among individuals was explained by the theory of Lamarckism - the inheritance of acquired characteristics. For example, fish living in dark caves were blind because they did not use their eyes. Swimming birds, such as ducks, acquired webbed feet by the stretching of the skin between their toes as they swam. These acquired characteristics were passed on from generation to generation. Thus, environment was the cause of variation. Food requirements, climate, and geographical conditions were believed to be the chief causes for bodily and physiological variations. August Weismann proposed the presently accepted theory, in the latter part of the nineteenth century. In his germ plasm theory, he stated that reproduction in animals does not occur from body cells, but from germ plasm (known today as chromosomes - the carriers of the genes that convey hereditary characteristics) which is passed from generation to generation unchanged, except by random mutation.

The Austrian monk, Gregor Mendel, experimenting with garden peas, supported this theory and laid the foundation principles for the modern science of genetics (1866). He was the first to consider each trait individually and develop two basic principles, (1) independent segregation of chromosomes and their subsequent (2) independent recombination. These two principles will be discussed further in a following article.

As in any science, business or profession, genetics has its own language. Some of the basics of this language will be useful to review here.

Genetics is the science that seeks to explain the resemblances and differences shown by related animals. The field of genetics is studied in three divisions: the chemical nature and structure of genes; the processes of differentiation (continued on page 24) "BRED FOR QUALITY AND TEMPERAMENT"





Another four studs gained a place on my personal "register of merit" during the past year. The great CH. CAMBRIA'S TI-MUNGAI welcomes two of his sons, CH. CAMBRIA'S NYAKATII and CH. CAMBRIA'S TI-TJADER to the list. CH. GLENAIRLEY GOLDEN FRESCO adds a "hewdy" to his offspring CH. He has good length of leg and a nice head. We find most of our dogs over here were, and still are, too coarse in head and too heavy in bone. If he was red and white they would like him better.

Our little girl is good in bone and head, but a little short in leg. I would say she has a good tail set, she is 23 pounds now. One time she was 27 pounds. I don't like her ears very much - she does not hold them very good, but her movement is excellent. We think she is lovely anyway and we would not trade her for the world. She's one of the family. We have so much fun and learned so much since we got her.

Mrs. Clatworthy's two bitches just gave birth to two litters. They are very nice - two or three of them will be shown, so we will see them in the ring by the end of the year.

More and more people are getting to know them better now. We go to quite a few country shows and the things one hears. Sometimes you don't know whether to laugh or cry - it all depends on your sense of humor, I think. I was in the ring one day and my husband was watching from the side and he overheard two women talking. One said, "Oh, that's a Basenji." The other said, "What's that, a disease?" "No," the other said, "it's a Basenji - they don't bark." "Why not?" "Because they cut their vocal cords when they are pups." "Oh, the poor

### MIDWEST FROLICS

Dearest Basenji,

This letter is in reference to your growing reputation as a "furniture-ivorous" animal (chewer) as compared to carnivorous. I am wondering how you managed to acquire this label, seemingly mentioned almost synonymously with the Basenji. It's somewhat of a mystery to me. Every so often, I meet a Basenji breeder or owner who will almost boastfully describe his Basenji's accomplishments in furniture destruction. It seems to me that the Basenji has many fine qualities to brag about, and to exaggerate individual cases as being a breed characteristic, such as chewing, is unnecessary. One breed can't claim everything, you know.

I've heard of cases in which dogs of other breeds have at least matched, if not surpassed you in the field of chewing. For instance, a pair of Boxers who tore down everything in an apartment from the pictures on the walls to the carpets on the floors. They may have overlooked a few ash trays, but nonetheless, I consider this quite an accomplishment in a limited period of three hours. However, there were two on the job! I also know of a Visla who completely destroyed a mattress and box springs in a very short time. An Airdale, a Dachshund, a Poodle, a Weimaraner; oh, I could go on, but I'm certain you understand what I'm implying. You'll simply have to come down to earth and admit, although you have some distinguishing characteristics, you are still classified as "Canis familiaris" or dog.

There are numerous articles in books and pamphlets discussing "Why a dog needs to chew." If you'll bother yourself to do research on this topic, you'll notice they do not single out the Basenji breed. There are numerous explanations

offered, such as chewing on something partially cleans the teeth, massages the gums, and relieves "doggie tensions." Puppies also need something to chew on while their teeth and jaws are developing.

I suppose if a new Basenji owner is informed by the breeder that "Basenjis are chewers" rather than "puppies will chew," the new owner may not bother himself to correct the Basenji and direct it to proper articles such as rawhides, etc., on which it may fulfill its chewing needs. Thus, a feeling of anathy developes toward Basenji chewing and is passed along from owner to owner. On the other hand, those people wise enough to realize the Basenji puppy is much like a puppy of any other breed inasmuch as training and guidance, along with love, are required to produce a dog who is well behaved and knowledgeable to what is expected of him. Though this may surprise you, some people actually feel destructive chewing is undesirable and shy away from having a Basenji in their home because of the exaggerated reputation as a chewer.

Just because there may be a new baby in your home, Basenji, you may have been deprived of some privileges and shunned a little. When you're not being patted or played with, it's only natural for you to revert to chewing some little (or big) tidbit out of boredom. That's only natural for you and other breeds of dogs who love their families and feel rejected. Or you, Puppy Basenji, who is left alone all day - what could pass the time more quickly than exploring and chewing? These are only two possible motives you may have. Situations as these are not typical only to Basenjis and neither is the

This is why I think the accent on Basenjis as chewers should not be further exaggerated, but modified truer to reality. I do not intend to deprive you completely of a chewing (continued on page 24)

## Championship Shows In Great Britain

Following the W. E. L. K. S. show, challenge certificates were next on offer for Basenjis at Glasgow, Scotland. This is now the only championship show in Scotland where challenge certificates can be gained in our breed. Although entries are never very large there, mainly because of the distances involved for English exhibitors who make most of the entries, C.C's. are allotted by the kennel club in order that the breed may be seen in Scotland. The average entry is about six per class, but this year there was at least a very good entry of 13 in open bitch. The judge was Mr. A. W. Fullwood, one of our senior all-rounders who has been judging the breed for as long as I can remember.

This show does not usually produce any news partic-(ularly worthy of note, but this year made history in that, for the first time over here, the two contestants for the dog C.C. were both black and white - Mrs. Ford's TAYSENJI YOKO, on which I have commented favourably before, and Mrs. Stringer's younger dog, SIR BUNTAR OF HORSLEY which I have not yet seen. The eventual winner was YOKO with SIR BUNTAR the reserve. The C.C. in bitches and Best of Breed was won by Mrs. Stringer's CH. SIREN OF HORSLEY, the winner at W. E. L. K. S. who is obviously making a very successful comeback, and reserve to her was Diane Berry's CH. HOBBY HORSE OF SIN.

At Leeds Championship Show on the 25th of May, there was an average entry of 29 Basenjis, making 54 entries, an average of 7.7 per class, and Mrs. Stringer was the judge elect. The highlight of this show was the gaining of her third and qualifying C.C. by Mr. Fleming's r/w bitch PITA YAMBA. This win caused general pleasure around the ringside as she has been shown consistently and fearlessly over a long period, and has been very unlucky, having, apart from her C.C's. gained about a dozen reserve C.C'S. I gained personal pleasure in that I awarded this bitch her second C.C. at the same show in 1967. I had, in fact, tried to buy her as a puppy. I am sure that Jack Fleming is now glad that he didn't sell! Reserve to him was Miss Rutherford's r/w TAYSENJI TUYEY. 

#### REVEILLE BASENJIS

More than a dozen years ago when Bettina Belmont Ward wanted to start a kennel of Basenjis in Middleburg, Virginia, I started my first job with her. She had already imported GOLD PIP OF THE CONGO and RED WING OF THE CONGO from Veronica Tudor-Williams. Her next acquisition and one that made tremendous impact as a sire, was BRAHME OF SYNGEFIELD. These three all became champions, as well as her subsequent imports, RIVIANA JOLLITY OF THE CONGO, VICTORY OF SYNGEFIELD and MY LOVE OF THE CONGO. Mrs. Ward gave the breed a tremendous boost with excellent foundation stock, a good breeding program and extensive breeding and showing. She gave me my choice of the first crop of six litters and BETTINA'S FEDHA (Ch. Gold Pip of the Congo x Ch. Riviana Jollity of the Congo) became my constant companion. "CHIPMONK," as she is known to her many, many friends, finished her title with her fourth straight major at the Garden in 1957.

After leaving Middleburg, I continued with the Basenjis in a small, select way, and also obtained my all-breed handlers license. "CHIPMONK" produced, by BLACK CLARION OF THE CONGO, CH. REVEILLE RIFLEMAN who before his untimely death, sired one litter in which was CH. REVEILLE RECRUIT. "ROOKIE" garnered 112 Best of Breeds and 63 group placings, including six firsts. To date, he has sired 17 champions with many more on the way. FULA REVEILLE OF THE CONGO, from Miss Tudor-Williams, has also made his mark as a sire with 11 champions to date and more on the way. CH. RUFFLES OF ROSE-BAY, bred by the William C. Hills, by FULA REVEILLE out of their CH. ROSE-BAY'S GAY BUTA, has combined very successfully with her grandsire RECRUIT, to produce 14 offspring so far. These include the Best in Show Winner CH. REVEILLE RE-UP: REVEILLE RED ALERT; ROSETTE, REWARD, RECALL TO ROSE-BAY, RELAY TO WILBARRIE, RATOON, REGALIA and others who have not yet made their ring debuts. Another of note that has borne the REVEILLE prefix is REVEILLE RAISE THE FLAG.

It has been over twenty years since I showed my first dog, and with ideals and a standard clearly in mind, we expect to continue on the same modest scale - to work toward the - - - Damara Bolte' best interest of the breed.

Our thanks to Damara for her short descriptive story. I am sure that all will agree that she has been far too modest in telling of her early days as a Basenji "pioneer." Damara, ROOKIE (CH. REVEILLE RECRUIT), and WILLIE WAG TAIL (FULA REVEILLE OF THE CONGO) are synonymous with the best in Baseniis. Together they have done much to improve and promote the breed. I'm sure we all acknowledge and appreciate her dedication and assistance.



During my impressionable years, I was much taken with Dale Carnegie's, "How to Win Friends and Influence People."

I can't say that I profited from the book to the extent that I conquered the world with my winning smile and charming personality. I rather think I inadvertently applied the Carnegie technique in my relationship with dogs. Among canines, I rate ace-high!

In the past two years, I've had a liberal education into the nature of the Basenji. I've been owned by one. It has been long ascertained that each breed has characteristic traits; each individual a distinct personality.

The ancient dog of Egypt and the Congo is no exception and if the novice owner expects to find the general characteristics of the hound group in the Basenji, he is due for a surprise.

True, the Basenji is a hunting dog - one of the best, I am told, but that is not his prime mission in life. The Basenji hunts to serve his master rather than for the spoil or sport.

Unlike many of the hound breeds, the Basenji cannot be put into a pack for training under the leadership of a seasoned hunting dog. He hunts with and for man.

This predominant desire for human companionship dates back to the days, hundreds of years ago, when the little barkless dog was a treasured member of the tribal households, to the extent they rated in monetary value far above the price of a wife.

So beloved were these dogs that they were carried on the shoulders of natives as they travelled through the jungles on hunting expeditions lest they be injured or lost in the tangled virulent growth. When he was hunted, he wore a wooden bell so that he would not be lost in the tall grass as he leapt through them in search of game. The Basenji was loved, protected and held in high regard. In turn the dog favored man with loyalty and devotion.

Today one does not purchase a Basenji, put him in a clean, comfortable kennel, take him dutifully to training classes and daily exercise or otherwise give him a "wholesome" dog's life. That is, one does not follow this procedure if he wishes to be owned by a Basenji. Firmness, born of strict discipline and stern handling is no way to win a Basenji.

It takes love, my friends, to win a Basenji. L-O-V-E. Real, honest-to-goodness love. A gentle word given as a command, a kindly pat of encouragement, an offer to share life on a common ground of mutual understanding makes a Basenji yours 'till death do you part.

Another went to a large kennel to be trained for hunting purposes. Unfortunately, his training was attempted in a pack, under the leadership of an experienced hunting dog. He was given no individual attention, offered no close companionship with his new owner, although he was meticulously cared for. The training program was a complete failure. The dog developed a belligerent nature, was a troublemaker among the other dogs, impossible to discipline. Eventually, he was given to a young boy for a pet and when the Basenji found himself the center of the youth's affection, became a model of gentleness and discipline.

Another dog of this litter went to a teenager who was mainly interested in obedience work. The dog was confined to a kennel area quite a distance from the house, taken out regularly for exercise and training. Rather than attempting to establish a friendly relationship with the dog, the youngster concentrated on obedience training. Remember - it takes LOVE. The dog immediately became a sore spot. He howled, he screamed throughout the night. He climbed the fence and with the unerring instinct of the Basenji in his need for human companionship, sought admittance into the house and was promptly rejected. He gnawed through his kennel door, snatched clothing from a neighbor's line and chewed it to shreds. He was scolded and chastised but his young owner forgot to add a helping of love to the lonely puppy who had previously known only a frolicsome life with his littermates, secure in the loving care and companionship with his original owners.

### AFTER SIXTY, STOP AND THINK!

Mrs. P. Fell, Cornborough, Middle Bourne Lane North Farnham, Surrey, England

My first Basenji was put into my hands at ten weeks old. Iwas completely fascinated by the little prick eared, silky coated object - like a piece of living Copenhagen china. The customary statement, "Do not let her get the upper hand" seemed absurd. I had kept dogs since I was sixteen (a long time ago), and soon realised this was no ordinary dog. Its desire, fierce and vocal, to be with me day and night, the rending of soft furnishings if left alone, was a new experience.

My first joyous return to my cottage on Dartmoor Shores with this new companion was only clouded by the following event —

We walked by the River Dart in late spring, a small high bridge spanned the river - on the opposite side, Scotch sheep and their well-grown lambs grazed. A jet-propelled red and white object (12 weeks old) shot across the shaky bridge, driving lambs and sheep at speed up to the high moor, all became invisible. A great silence fell and with it a feeling of loss. So tiny a creature, so young, could surely never find her way back. But 35 minutes later, a small dot, moving fast toward me, turned out to be my red and white treasure Later, much laborious training on long leads, beatings, and shuttings up, proximity with a ram in an enclosed field. All were fruitless and to this day, eleven and a half years later, no moving object fails to be pursued.

I moved to Surrey, near a Forestry Reserve, where Basenjis can run free for miles. Only deer and rabbits haunt this habitat. Yearly visits to Dartmoor are still menaced by constant vigilance, or have the Basenjis on leash.

I fell victim to the dog showing disease, acquired a

really good bitch puppy who was almost to bankrupt me. Refusal to show, dislike of judges, long journeys and hotel bills at times in vain - nearly two years elapsed before the incredible thrill of a third and qualifying challenge certificate a Champion came home. Six times reserve to the C.C., chances thrown away by refusal to cooperate, but what fun it was, what friends made and lessons learned - the years sped past, the dogs seemed eternal, but I had well passed the sixty mark, had nine grandchildren. I should have spent spare time sitting with embroidery by the fire, not madly exercising dogs in all weathers. Came ice and snow and calamity - a broken femur - hospital for a month - dogs humanized to a great degree by constant day and night proximity were mercifully cared for by my son's wife. A great chore as this brought her dog population to five, including an 8-month old Bull Mastiff. Her child population was six. All the bitches came prematurely in heat. I emerged from the hospital on two hand crutches thinking hopefully that a few weeks would see us all in the woods again, minus stick or crutch. Six months have gone, one crutch remains. I cannot recommend walks with two Basenjis on a double coupling lead, one tiny reliable Tibetan Spaniel, mainly free and still the crutch. But much ungrudging help from the same source though now the dogs are under my roof. Living alone, except for dogs, can become a hazardous undertaking if illness or accident occurs. Basenjis are not dogs for old people - they need comparable vitality. Of course, to those with dog kennels and with large runs, none of this applies. But if well advanced in years, you encounter for the first time, a wrinkled head, old as the rocks and the desert, a fawn-like body, young as the spring, steer clear. Do not own it, shun the magic of Egypt, the primitive call of the Congo, or you will be in bondage unsuitable for your years, if they be more than 60 at the least!



and organization as the embryo develops, and the mode of transmission of hereditary determiners (genes) from parent to offspring. The latter holds the greatest interest for the animal

Heredity is described as transmission of biological traits from ancestors to descendants. These traits are qualitative or quantitative in nature. Qualitative traits are determined by one or two pairs of genes and are clearly defined. An example in Basenjis would be the tri-color and the red and white color coats. In contrast, quantitative characters show many variations. Again, using Basenjis, you see taller upstanding dogs, and short squat dogs, with every combination in between. We will be talking about qualitative heredity in a

Genes are the units of heredity. They are completely responsible for the expression of any characteristic, be it coat color, curls of the tail, or the barkless feature of the Basenji. The genes of higher organisms consist of deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA). The DNA structure consists of many different genes. Its role as genetic material is to determine the nature of each of the cellular proteins synthesized which in turn, give rise to cytological expression in the form of coat color, body build, etc.

A single molecule of DNA (which occurs as a long strand of genes shaped in a closed circular pattern) is known as a Chromosome. Chromosomes occur in pairs in a cell. Thus each gene located on a chromosome has a complimentar y gene on its sister chromosome. These two genes may be the same, or one may be a variation of the other, in which case, it is called the allele of its sister gene. An example of this would be normal pigmentation (Gene 1) versus albinism (Gene 2). Gene 2 (albinism) is an allele of Gene 1.

A carrier is an individual animal who carries a recessive gene that is not expressed because it is obscurred by a dominant allele. The above discussion of normal pigmentation versus albinism is an example.

In next month's installment, we will talk about the dominant genes, the hybrid animal, phenotype, etc.

reputation, but only put it into its proper perspective. I know as long as Basenjis are dogs, they are apt to do some chewing as most dogs do. But Basenjis, as a breed, do not hold the title of "Champion in the art of chewing!"

Commander Stringer. This dog was, of course, bred by Mr. Fleming and must have given him additional pleasure. The Reserve C.C. in dogs was won by Mrs. Howe's r/w BELBRAQ NICHOLAS NICKLEBY, There are no puppy classes at these early shows, since the new crop of puppies are not ready until about July. The special yearling class, however, was won by one of the twins bred by Messrs. Kennedy and Binns - LINDY LOU OF CELLADORE.

The Cheshire championship show, held in the first week in June, is another show where large entries in Basenjis are not usually received. This is partly due to the time of the year, but also to the difficulty associated with the geographical position of the venue for many exhibitors, praticularly those travelling by rail. However, the entry this year of about 7 per class in the six classes ensured reasonable competition with Mr. J. Bower, another all-rounder, as the judge. FULA FALCON once more swept aside the opposition to gain the Best of Breed award. BASIL OF NIANGARA, the Leeds winner topped the Limit class (mixed for dogs and bitches) but could only gain third place in Open Dog, the second place and Reserve C.C. going to Berry's TOPFLIGHT OF SIN. The recorded results of the Open Bitch class suggest very hot competition, with one of those reversals of fortune which add interest to the dog game. Two well-known bitches occupied the second and third places second place being Mrs. Gallagher's tri ILONA OF MOCHI, the C.C. winner at Manchester, and third to Mrs. Stringer's CH. SIREN OF HORSLEY, Best of Breed winner at the two previous championship shows. The eventual winner of the class was Mrs. Coutts' ZATOPEC ZANTY gaining her first C.C., and that of her, no doubt, excited owners. She is a well-made r/w, very well balanced. I judged her at the same show in 1967 and thought her very promising, although at that time was rather pale in coat, but since then she has been chalking up steadily some respectable wins in the junior classes. Her good construction, she no doubt, owes to her sire FULA FALCON.

There have been a number of wins of this kind this year which give the lie to the belief that to gain a major success, the exhibit must be well known or the owner of a long established kennel. I am sure that this is good for the breed and should give added encouragement to newcomers. From my own observation, I am sure that it is generally the case in this country, that a really good dog, adequately prepared, cared for and exhibited, can be made up, whatever its origins and ownership, Mrs. Stringer must have gained consolation from a good win in the mixed Limit class of her young b/w dog SIR BUNTAR OF HORSLEY.

The end of June is always an important time for Basenii exhibitors over here since it is the time for Windsor show, an extremely popular event generally for its beautiful and wonderfully sited venue underneath the noble walls of Windsor Castle, but particularly in the Basenji world for the generous classification and large entry, with the season's new puppies appearing on the scene. There was an entry this year of 104 in the eleven classes. This time there was a specialist (breeder) judge, in the person of Miss Gillian Percival of the Little Breach Baseniis.

In this event, the new puppies provided the thrills. The major one being the carrying off from the puppy dog class of the dog C. C. and Best of Breed awards by Mrs. Cardew's r/w

She has been most successful in Wire Fox Terriers and Chihuahuas. Another fine win was that of Mrs. Stringer's r/w SIR CLARENCIA OF HORSLEY which headed the puppy, novice and graduate bitch classes and eventually gained the Reserve C. C. The bitch C. C. went to Mrs. Gallagher's tri ILONA OF MOCHI, her second.

Two important events for the Basenji Club of Great Britain take place during the next month, both in London. The most important is the specialty championship show of the club which annually attracts the largest representation of the breed. Held in the centre of London, it is to be judged this year by Miss Veronica Tudor-Williams who needs no introduction. I trust that this year Veronica will take special care to prevent the kind of unfortunate mishap which prevented her from judging this show last year. I am hoping to attend and will endeavour to supply a full report.

The week before sees the Open Show of the club held in conjunction with the Hound Championship Show at Alexandra Palace. Although there are no C. C's. available for Basenjis at this show, it is always well supported and attracts an entry of championship show quantity and quality. CONVULSIONS, COMMON CANINE CONDITION

Veterinarians frequently receive telephone calls from pet owners, who are extremely worried about sudden changes in attitude and appearance in what a short time ago was an apparently healthy pet.

The most difficult problem that arises initially is to calm the owner enough to get an accurate description of what is taking place. It is not difficult to understand the distress of this person, as very often there is good reason to worry.

The subject of convulsions, fits, or seizures, is very interesting and very often complex. Perhaps we should start with a definition of the word "convulsion," and proceed from there. According to the Blackiston's New Gould Medical Dictionary, a convulsion is an involuntary general paroxysm of muscular contraction. It is either clonic (without relaxation) or tonic (with relaxation), having alternate contractions of opposite groups of muscles. The word "paroxysm" means a sudden attack, a sudden reappearance of symptoms, or the periodic increase of crisis in the progress of a disease.

Simply stated, this means that an animal having a convulsion, will exhibit constant or alternating, uncontrollable muscle spasms which can produce anything from a mild twitching of a small group of muscles, to generalized contractions of muscles throughout the entire body. Usually the first signs of an impending convulsion are a general uneasiness, restlessness and apparent confusion. The symptoms then progress into a convulsive seizure of varying intensity, depending on what is the underlying cause.

When a pet is unfortunate enough to go into convulsions, it is essential to contact a veterinarian immediately. In order for him to track down the causative agent quickly, it is essential that you indicate the exact nature of the symptoms, and try to find out to the best of your ability if there is anything around the home that could be involved. Generally speaking, animals in convulsion are not dangerous, but the lack of ability to control muscle movements could lead to unintentional biting or scratching of the handler.

IN CASE OF POISON

If it is determined at home that some toxic agent has been eaten by the animal, attempt to induce vomiting by stimulating the gag reflex. If this does not work - warm milk can be given. Meanwhile, arrangements should have been made to bring the animal to the hospital immediately as every minute can be the margin of difference between life and death.

In cases of head injuries, it is, of course, contraindicated to induce vomiting. Quiet and gentle handling of

accident cases is very beneficial to the patient while transporting him to the hospital.

Canine distemper has been discussed in detail in a previous article. One of the most serious symptoms of distemper occurs after the virus has invaded the cells of the brain which control muscle movements. At this stage in the disease, convulsions occur. They start out rather mild and infrequent, but become progressively more severe, and involve a larger area of the body. Convulsions associated with epilepsy in dogs are frequent in nature, and appear at rather constant intervals.


